Fiscal Year 2014

Moving Forward

- 37% of the men were engaged in one-on-one discipleship with Emmaus staff
- 9% of the men came to faith in Jesus Christ or renewed their faith in him


Results

- 21% of the men who came to the Ministry Center this year were first-time visitors
- 22% of the men found permanent housing
- 14% of the men who were unemployed found jobs
- 18% of men who were prostituting at the beginning of the year stopped all prostitution activity
- 21% of the men reconciled or reconnected with their families
- 12% of the men went back to school or gained specialized vocational training

Change was again a major theme this past year, as was the incredible faithfulness of God. We found a new building and made major progress in starting a business. (See page 2 for more details!) And we continued to make a real difference in the lives of hundreds of men in Chicago whom no one else is serving.

Outreach

We made 945 contacts with 282 individuals more than twice the number of men we encountered last year

55 of the men we encountered, or about 20%, were new contacts about 17%, came to the

The numbers tell the story



Ministry Center

109 men made 2,360 visits, were served 300 meals, took 528 showers, one-hour presentations did 533 loads of laundry, on the ministry and received clothing 407 times

18 of these men, or Ministry Center for the first time

Men met with staff 495 times and attended small groups and Bible studies 646 times



Educational Ministries

We hosted 400 people for Immersion Nights or

We held 3 volunteer trainings, which 27 people completed

We had 3 Kaio Community members and 5 interns

We gave presentations on Emmaus at 16 universities and 12 churches



Stories from the Streets

Al & Andi Tauber performed "Stories from the Streets: Going Home" 19 times to 926 individuals at 7 universities and 9 churches

Through their efforts, over 120 people became connected to Emmaus for the first time



HIV Outreach Events

We hosted 6 events around the city

We counseled or shared HIV information with 3,216 people who attended

Farewell **Doug Van** Ramshorst



From January 2005 to April 2014, if someone encountered Emmaus on Outreach, there's a good chance he did so through Doug Van Ramshorst, our longtime Outreach Director. Doug has a gift for connecting with just about anyone. In nine years, he walked thousands of miles on Chicago's streets, forged hundreds of relationships with the men he met, and helped many of them transform their lives.

Doug left Emmaus in late April. As much as he loved his work with our men, he loved spending time with his wife and infant son more. The late night Outreach schedule kept him from doing that. He has a new job that's very similar: daytime outreach for a regional hospital in northwestern Indiana. It's 10 minutes from his house and it's a 9-to-5 schedule. We are sad that he's left, but we understand.

Doug has been succeeded by Caleb Anderson, who served with us for two years in our Kaio Community before being promoted to Outreach Coordinator. We are excited at the difference Caleb is making on the streets in his new role. We are also thankful that Doug remains connected to Emmaus as a regular Outreach volunteer.
